Once ignored in civic and urban planning, historic preservation is now seen as integral to the definition and protection of the cultural landscape. Historic preservation planning and cultural resource management (CRM) are accomplished through the identification, evaluation, documentation, registration, treatment, and ongoing stewardship of historic properties. This course examines the processes of preservation planning and management that have been established by the National Park Service of the United States and by comparable agencies in other countries, and illustrates the application of these standards at the federal, state and local levels.

Ethnography is a method used by folklorists to document the past--and present--by drawing on the knowledge of individuals and communities based on their personal experiences, cultural practices, or local lore. Through recorded interviews and the use of photographs, material objects, written documents, and even landscapes and the built environment, ethnographies often create the first tangible record of people, places, everyday life, historical events, or customs and traditions where none existed except in memory. This course will draw on folklorists' skills and multimedia productions to demonstrate how to conduct ethnographic interviews, choose appropriate documentation technology and techniques, and give examples of how to present and preserve a final project. No required texts, but an extensive bibliography will be provided. A final project is required and winter holidays can provide many research opportunities.
