A TRADITION STEEPED IN HISTORY

The Academic Procession is a descendant of European religious processions, which began to include teaching faculties in the Middle Ages, when universities were closely associated with the medieval church.

The order used in today's procession has evolved through many years of practice at Plymouth State University. At the front of the line is the faculty marshal, who will carry the University mace, a symbol of authority and unity. The marshal will be followed in the procession by four flag bearers, the president of Plymouth State University, the provost, members of the University System Board of Trustees, honored guests, speakers, vice presidents, and senior class officers. This group is followed by the faculty, who march in order of rank. The faculty is followed by the degree candidates.

THE MACE

The tradition of the academic mace began in the late fourteenth century when two ancient instruments, the royal scepter and the battle mace, were combined to form a symbol of authority of the rector of a university. Today, the academic mace, along with the presidential medallion, signifies that the president of the university is the temporary embodiment of the power, authority, and autonomy vested in the institution.

The faculty marshal carries the academic mace at public events such as Commencement exercises and convocations as a symbol of the special stewardship authority and trust reposed in the faculty for the curriculum and academic affairs of the university. The PSU mace was designed and created by Professor Emeritus of Sculpture Philip Lonergan in 2004.

THE PRESIDENTIAL MEDALLION

The Presidential Medallion is the official insignia of the President's Office and is worn on ceremonial occasions. Created when Plymouth State became a university, the medallion embodies parts of the official seal of the University, showing pictorial representations of Rounds Hall, the Old Man of the Mountain, the lamp of enlightenment, and our connection to the outdoors.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

The caps, gowns, and hoods seen today have evolved from costumes worn during early religious processions to distinguish church and university members from the laity. In present times, the attire serves to indicate, by style and adornment, the chief academic degree attained, the major field of study, and the college or university attended by the wearer.

THE GOWN

The modern academic costume worn in the United States is based on an intercollegiate code established in 1895. Most gowns are black, but more American colleges and universities now permit the wearing of college colors. The associate's gown and the bachelor's gown are the same. They have long, pointed sleeves, and are untrimmed and worn closed. The master's gown, worn either open or closed, has long, crescent-shaped sleeves. The doctoral gown has black velvet panels down the front, and velvet bars on bell-shaped sleeves.

THE CAP

The customary head covering is either the mortarboard or the Oxford cap. The tassel on the mortarboard cap may be black or of a color indicating the degree. The doctor's tassel is usually gold in color. The tassel is worn over the left front quarter of the mortarboard once the degree has been awarded.

THE HOOD

The hood, which drapes over the back of the gown, carries the greatest symbolism of all the components of the academic costume, and dates back to the twelfth century when it was intended as a head cover or shoulder cape. Its length and width denote the wearer's highest academic achievement. The color of the velvet trim reveals the wearer's major field of study. Linings, which are exposed in the center of the hood as it lies over the back of the gown, indicate the colors of the degree-granting institution.

THE COLORS

In regalia, academic disciplines are noted by color. These colors can be found on undergraduate and master's tassels and on master's and doctoral hoods on the velvet edging.

THE CORD AND STOLE

Cords, medallions, or colored tassels may be worn by some members of academic honor societies to signify their achievements. The standards for this distinction are set by each honor society. The cords are worn around the neck and drape down the front of the gown.

Veterans, active duty personnel, and ROTC students may wear a red, white, and blue cord to acknowledge their service to our country.

Members of several student organizations, University programs, and student athletes may also wear a stole in recognition of that involvement. The stole may be adorned with the emblem(s) of the organization(s) in which the student has participated.

PSU's international students may choose to wear a stole or lapel pin displaying the flag of their home countries. This year features graduate and undergraduate students from Cambodia, Canada, Czech Republic, Finland, Germany, Netherlands, Norway, and Sweden.

THE HONORS TASSEL

Green and white tassels distinguish honors baccalaureate graduates. **Summa cum laude** is granted to a graduate with a GPA of 3.75–4.0. **Magna cum laude** is granted to a graduate with a GPA of 3.50–3.74. **Cum laude** is granted to a graduate with a GPA of 3.25–3.49.

COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER

Sheryl L. Shirley, Professor Emerita of Political Science

Dr. Sheryl L. Shirley is former commissioner/chair of the New Hampshire Commission for Human Rights, professor emerita of political science at Plymouth State University, and the current chair of Transport Central. As a commissioner with the New Hampshire Commission for Human Rights, Dr. Shirley worked to protect the public welfare, health, and peace in fulfillment of the state constitution. She reviewed discrimination complaints and investigative reports, made determinations regarding probable cause, and adjudicated cases in public hearings of the state's primary fair employment practices agency. In her tenure as chair of the Commission, she assumed additional roles leading the board in meetings, conducting research involving discrimination law, and engaging in public outreach.

Professor Shirley's teaching at Plymouth State University was informed by her educational background and scholarly research as well as her civil rights work. She earned her master's and doctoral degrees from the Department of Government at the University of Texas at Austin, focusing her early research on military intervention and challenges to democratic development. Her teaching and research while at Plymouth State University was interdisciplinary, connecting the fields of government, human rights, economics, and environmental sustainability. She served the Plymouth State University community through her leadership of an innovative Cluster, as chair of the General Education Committee, and in her role as adviser to student organizations. She presented research at conferences of the New England and Northeastern Political Science Association and published research in both national and international journals.

Following her retirement from Plymouth State University in 2021, Dr. Shirley began working to improve the lives of Granite State residents through her service on the board of Transport Central, a regional nonprofit dedicated to improving the health of local seniors by providing them with free transportation to non-emergency medical appointments. She is also using her teaching and community building skills as a member of Artistic Roots, a cooperative, nonprofit art gallery of dedicated juried artists who seek to inspire, create, and connect artists and the community through workshops, peer mentoring, and events.



GRADUATE STUDENT SPEAKER

Dawn Nyree Sanchez '24, '25G

Dawn Nyree Sanchez is an American author, motivational speaker, military wife, and ministry and life coach. Her self-help books include *Call to Duty* and *Now I Know I Am Beautiful*.

Born in Chicago, Sanchez was encouraged as a public speaker at a young age. She later began motivational speaking while traveling with her husband in the military, which led to speaking engagements at bases around the world. In 2020, she opened her business, Diamond Dynasty Consultant, and her podcast became one of the top 20 inspirational podcasts during the pandemic. In 2023, she received the New Hampshire Association of Broadcasters Student Scholarship Award.

Sanchez's PSU contributions include serving as vice president of Lambda Pi Eta, a National Honor Society for communication majors; and member of the Future Alumni Board (FAB). She is also actively involved in her Franklin, NH, community, serving on the board of directors of HealthFirst Family Care Center.

Sanchez earned her BA in communication and media studies and MA in organizational leadership and plans to give back to PSU as a future member of the faculty.





2024 DISTINGUISHED GRADUATE TEACHING AWARD

Liesl Lindley '04 CAGS, MA, NH LAT, ATC, Clinical Education Coordinator

Lindley holds a bachelor's degree from Appalachian State University, a master's from Furman University, and a certificate of advanced graduate studies from PSU.

She has been a certified athletic trainer for over 30 years, serving as the clinical education coordinator for the Plymouth State University graduate athletic training program since 2001. She teaches in both the undergraduate allied health sciences and the graduate athletic training programs. She has also provided athletic training services to many of the University's athletic teams, including as the primary athletic trainer for the Women's Basketball Team.



2024 EXCELLENCE IN FACULTY SERVICE AWARD

Rebecca Grant '02, '08 MEd, '20 EdD, Associate Professor of Practice, English Department

Grant earned a bachelor of arts cum laude in English literature, a master's in education in secondary English education, and her doctorate in education leadership. She has been teaching in the University's English program since 2008.

Grant's many service contributions include serving as chair of the Faculty Welfare Committee; representative to the Student Senate; English program co-coordinator; NECHE team member; interim director of composition; voting member of the Academic Technology Committee and the Promotion, Tenure, and Evaluation Advisory; and academic guide for the Rebalance program; among others.



2024 DISTINGUISHED TEACHING LECTURER AWARD

Jacqui Nelson '09, Teaching Lecturer

Nelson earned a bachelor's degree in history at Plymouth State University before completing a master's program in military history at Norwich University. Her courses include War in US History, the American Revolution, Civil War, World War II, and Piracy and Ancient Warfare.

Nelson also serves as interim coordinator of military services, and PSU recently achieved Gold Tier Military Friendly status. She is currently developing a book about the Trenton-Princeton Campaign in the American Revolution and is a regular contributor to the Remedial Herstory Project.

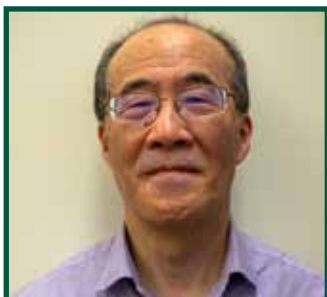


2024 DISTINGUISHED UNDERGRADUATE TEACHING AWARD

Paul Rogalus, PhD, Professor, Arts and Technologies Cluster

Rogalus holds a bachelor's degree in English from the University of Rhode Island, and he earned his master's in English from Boston College and his PhD from Purdue University.

In addition to teaching film, scriptwriting, and American literature at Plymouth State University, Rogalus is also faculty advisor to the college radio station and PSU Poets and Writers. His full-length and one-act plays have been produced in New York, Chicago, and Boston and his short screenplays have won screenwriting contests at multiple film festivals.



2024 DISTINGUISHED SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

Zhizhang Shen, PhD, Professor, Discipline of Computer Science and Technology

Shen's computer science degrees include a bachelor's from Zhejiang University, China; his master's from Queens College; and master's and doctorate from City University of New York.

Shen taught courses from fundamentals to theory of computing. He served as chair of the Computer Science and Technology Department twice, helped develop the Computer Science and Technology Program, and served as a department coordinator. With research partners, Shen also published 65 referred journal articles, two book chapters, and 37 reviewed conference papers.



2024 TRANSFORMATIVE TEACHING AWARD

Kelsie Brook Eckert '13 MEd, Coordinator of Social Studies Education

Eckert holds a bachelor's degree from Principia College and her master's from Plymouth State University. She serves as state coordinator for National History Day and board member for the New Hampshire Council for the Social Studies. She is the author of *Teaching Women's History: Undoing Male Centrism in K-12 Social Studies*, hosts a podcast on women's history, and is founder and director of the nonprofit Remedial Herstory Project. While teaching high school social studies, she was twice named New Hampshire History Teacher of the Year.
