The foreign language requirement for all BA degrees calls for 0-8 credits: one year of one language (6-8 credits); or one 3000/4000 level world language course (3 credits); or being a native speaker of a language other than English (zero credit). American Sign Language I and II fulfill this requirement; however, American Sign Language does **not** satisfy the Global Awareness Connection.

Students may transfer up to 50 percent of the required credits in the Criminal Justice BA degree program from an associate degree program. Students graduating with a BA in Criminal Justice must complete at least 50 percent of their credit hours through coursework offered by Plymouth State University.

For all students, at least 50 percent of the total coursework for the major must be at the 3000/4000 level. The Department of Criminal Justice does not award course credit for life experience or training.
